Land Acknowledgment

The Winnipeg Film Group (WFG) is a charitable, artist-run organization dedicated to promoting the art of cinema and serves as an affordable resource centre for independent filmmakers in Manitoba.

Incorporated in 1974, we encourage the production, presentation and distribution of films of a social, artistic, experimental and educational nature and to enhance the production and appreciation of film making.

The Winnipeg Film Group has three distinct departments, each working towards their own, if interconnected, objectives. These centres are the Dave Barber Cinematheque, Distribution Centre and Production Centre.



Message from Executive Director



My first year as Executive Director of the Winnipeg Film Group (WFG) began at the start of the 2022-23 fiscal. It was a tumultous beginning with a steep mountain of challenges. A sustained, concerted and collaborative effort from the whole community - WFG staff, Board, filmmakers, membership, patrons and partners to reignite our programming and spaces has made a positive difference.

Our earned revenues have increased by an average of 35% each year since the start of the pandemic. While this increase has been substantial, with COVID relief funding now over, inflation, and our public funding at a freeze, we are facing significant operating financial challenges.

Small to medium arts organizations like the WFG, to large ones across the country like TIFF and Hot Docs are facing simliar financial crises.

I echo Hot Doc's new president Marie Nelson's warning that more government support is needed to face unprecedented challenges for arts organizations across the country. We can't face this crisis alone.

I'd like to thank the whole WFG community for your support and devoted efforts to keep the WFG a place for everyone to make films and fulfill our mandate of advancing the art of the moving image.

Thanks to all the staff and to Dylan Baillie, Production Programs Manager, Jillian Groening, Distribution Director, Olivia Norquay, Programming Coorindator for their assistance in creating this annual report.

A special thanks to Amanda Kindzierski, Ben Williams, Karen Remoto and last but not least, Jaimz Asmundson for your guidance and mentorship.

The Board of Directors of the Winnipeg Film Group is responsible for governing and overseeing the strategic direction of the organization, which is dedicated to promoting and supporting independent filmmaking in Winnipeg and Manitoba. The board sets policies, ensures financial stability, and guides the organization's mission to provide resources, education, and opportunities for filmmakers.

The Board works closely with the Executive Director to ensure the organization's objectives are met and that it continues to foster a vibrant filmmaking community.

Core Operating Funding for 2022-2023

The WFG maintains our annual core funding from the Canada Council for the Arts (CCA), as well as annual operating from the Manitoba Arts Council (MAC) and the Winnipeg Arts Council (WAC). We also occasionally receive special project grants from them.

Canada Council for the Arts

2022-23 was the thrid year of our Core funding cycle from the Canada Council for the Arts.

We will receive \$285,870 each year in this cycle (2020-2027).

We received a Media Arts Equipment Acquisition Grant from the Canada Council for the arts in 2022-23 in the amount of \$29,060.



Manitoba Arts Council

Our annual operating funding from MAC has maintained consistent at \$95,000 since 2010-11.

We requested an increase with our 2024-25 funding application.

In 2022-23 MAC provided \$7, 125 for the Manitoba Hothouse Award for Creative Development.



Winnipeg Arts Council

We received \$51,800 from WAC, an increase from \$49,275 the previous year.



We received the final payments of COVID-19 related funding:

Government of Canada - \$20,076 - Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy

In Memoriam - Jaimz Asmundson (April 7, 1981 – January 1, 2024)

We would like to pay tribute to Jaimz Asmundson, Programming Director of the Dave Barber Cinematheque, who the community lost suddenly on January 1, 2024. As we reflect on his accomplishments, we are reminded of Jaimz' profound dedication to enrich the lives of others. We honour their memory and celebrate the legacy he has left behind.



Our dear friend, collaborator and coworker Jaimz Asmundson: a beloved member of the film, music and arts community passed away suddenly of an aneurysm on January 1, 2024. Jaimz's untimely departure has left us all with a deep sense of loss and an irreplaceable void in our hearts. Our thoughts are with Karen Asmundson, Graham Asmundson, Jackie, and all of his family, friends and colleagues.

Jaimz has been involved in the arts scene in Winnipeg since the age of 15. He was an extraordinary, gleefully transgressive, award-winning filmmaker, talented musician, film programmer and brilliant graphic designer known for his iconic original VHS covers.



Jaimz's short films screened worldwide at festivals such as Hot Docs, Antimatter, Festival du Nouveau Cinéma, Ann Arbor, Lausanne Underground, Dawson City, BFI, Queer City Cinema, POP Montreal and Fantasia. He created the cult Super 8 favorite "Goths! On The Bus!" (2010) which went viral for a time and led to a comprehensive federal ban on crows on public transit in Canada. Other notable, beautiful works include "The Magus" (2011), a film that documents his father, visual artist C. Graham Asmundson's body of work over a rigorous six-month period using cinematography and editing as magical weapons to ritualistically birth, destroy and resurrect his father's work; and "Echoes" (2015), a rich, process-based visual meditation about his memories and dreams prior to his mother's death.




Jaimz was a devoted cultural worker and dedicated much of his energy to the Film Group as the Programming Director of the Cinematheque in collaboration with Dave Barber for many years until Dave's untimely passing. Jaimz took over subsequently. Jaimz was also an early curatorial member of the WNDX Festival of Moving Image and took over the responsibility of producing multiple successful editions of the Gimme Some Truth documentary festival in Winnipeg.



Jaimz was a gifted film editor who became in demand in the local film industry, but he preferred to work with his friends in the arts community and mentor new talent.





As a member of the dark synthwave duo Ghost Twin, along with Karen, he was a fixture of the local music scene and toured extensively.


Beyond his professional achievements, Jaimz was a thoughtful, empathetic, kind-hearted soul known for his generosity, warmth and unwavering support for fellow artists. He was a true cinephile and beacon of creativity and passion, constantly encouraging others to pursue their artistic visions with courage and authenticity.

He was a devoted collector of VHS tapes, with peerless curatorial instincts and an almost frightening knowledge of the history and outer limits of these misbegotten formats. His passion was so great he modified the dashboard screen in his car to be able to play them. He was a well-known, respected, and much-loved member of the VHS community.

Above all, Jaimz was beloved by his colleagues. He was always most enthusiastic about creating commercials for Cinematheque, involving all the skills he had accrued from the many stations he had held in his life, his beloved coworkers and the comedic instincts he was raised with and knew instinctively. He could also bench press over 500 hundred pounds (on a machine).

Any future student interested in the Winnipeg Film Group will deeply miss Jaimz's presence, his sense of comedy is present in all of the films produced during his tenure there and is already deeply missed.



You Are In Bear Country: The Governmental Films of Matthew Rankin - June 10, 2023





WFG's MFM Manitoba Hothouse Award for Creative Development

In September of 2023, Adam Brooks received the Manitoba Film Hothouse Award, which recognizes the career of an established Manitoba filmmaker. It comes with \$10,000 in cash (courtesy of the Manitoba Arts Council and Manitoba Film and Music), \$5,000 in WFG production services, and a WFG Membership with Production Add-on.

Adam was selected for the award unanimously by a peer assessment selection committee comprised of: filmmaker Heidi Phillips, photographer and filmmaker Diana Thorneycroft and visual artist Luther Konadu. The selection committee was chaired by WFG's Executive Director Leslie Supnet.



Adam Brooks Biography

Born and raised in Winnipeg, Manitoba, Adam Brooks dreamed of drawing comic books for a living before he set his sights on the world of fine arts. He exhibited his oil paintings at The <SITE> Gallery and the Winnipeg Art Gallery among others before ever stepping foot on a film set. In 2006 he formed the filmmaking collective ASTRON-6 with four of his closest friends. Their films have been exhibited all over the world, most notably at The Toronto International Film Festival (2014) and The Sundance Film Festival (2019.) Adam has appeared in multiple films as an actor including 'Stump The Guesser' by Guy Maddin and the Johnson bros, and 'Psycho Goreman' by Astron-6 Alum Steven Kostanski. In 2019 Adam won the Best Actor award at The Gimli Film Festival for the Astron-6 picture 'Chowboys' and in 2022 he won Best Manitoba Director for his documentary 'Cliff: a Portrait of an Artist.' When he's not working he still finds time to draw and paint. One of his illustrations was recently featured on an episode of Amazon's 'The Boys' (s03e02). He still dreams of drawing comic books (or making movies) for a living and continues to make films and animations with his two sons in Winnipeg (see - 'Pandemic Bear' on Youtube).


In March of 2023, Angeline Javier received the WFG's Mosaic Award for her film "Pages", which includes:

As an emerging artist, she is dedicated to telling stories that shed light on underrepresented voices and issues.

Equipment Acquisitions

In October of 2022 the WFG's Production Centre acquired a new selection of lighting and grip gear. This includes a Aputure 600D LED Monolight, Amaran F22C LED Mat, and a variety of clamps and C-stands to support our full selection of grip gear. These lights have opened up new possibilities for filmmakers, especially the LED Mat which is fully RGBWW with excellent colour rendition.











TELEFILM: TALEN TO WATCH PROGRAM

The WFG re-opened it's dormant Telefilm Talent to Watch Designated Industry Partner Program, in March of 2023. Telefilm's Talent to Watch supports emerging filmmakers looking to finance the production stage of their first feature film project(s).

Emerging filmmakers were asked to apply to the WFG's Telefilm Talent to Watch Designated Industry Partner Program to be considered by an internal WFG jury for recommendation.

As a Designated Industry Partner, the WFG was eligible to recommend one first feature film (fiction or documentary) project to the Main component and Indigenous Component.

lan Bawa's *Strong Son* (Drama) was chosen by the WFG for recommendation from both the WFG and On Screen Manitoba.

lan's project was successful in securing Telefilm Talent to Watch Funding, in a very competitive awards process.

A commitment of \$3.6 million will be invested into these projects by Telefilm and the Talent Fund.






Highlights from the 2022-23 programming year:


The WFG Distribution Department offers personalized distribution services for filmmakers whose works align with the organization's objectives, which is to support Canadian artists while earning rental and sales revenue on the filmmaker's behalf. The department continues to evolve their services and skills to allow for changes in technology, demand of work, artistic output, and paid opportunities for artists. In addition to the daily distribution activities involving festival submissions, composing educational streaming licenses, and delivering film materials, the department strives to continually seek out and create screening opportunities for filmmakers in the WFG catalogue.

From July 1, 2022 through to June 30, 2023, there were a total of 178 screenings at film festivals, galleries, conferences, and arthouse cinemas around the globe. There were also 82 film sales. This figure encompasses not only DVD purchases, but also digital streaming license agreements purchased by educators, and films acquired by university libraries.

Indi - Visual 2 at EXIS Experimental Film and Video Festival focused on the works of Solomon Nagler. The film prints for skin of the cit-y (2016), genizah: passages from the lublin book graveyard (2018), perhaps/We (2003), Notes on Gesture (2010), The Sex of Self-Hatred (2004, and Fugue Nefesh (2007) played in Seoul, South Korea in July 2022.

In September 2022, La Cinematheque du documentaire a la Bpi in Paris, France presented a screening series which featured three works in the WFG Catalogue: Souvenirs: Waiting for the Parade by Paula Kelly (2008), yaya/ayat by Hagere Selam (shimby) Zegeye-Gebrehiwot (2010), and Caribou in the Archive by Jennifer Dysart (2019).

From September 2022 through February 2023, *Nosisim* (2017) by Sonya Ballantyne screened in the Daphne Odjjig Exhibition at the Art Gallery of Windsor.

In September 2022, the Cinema Politica Film Network hosted the "First Peoples, First Screens" program, which featured films from the WFG Catalogue. The featured films include A Common Experience by Shane Belcourt (2013), Four Faces of the Moon by Amanda Strong (2016), Indian by Darryl Nepinak (2008), Heart by Sam Karney (2015), and Two Scoops by Jackie Traverse (2008).

WFG Catalogue screening highlights continued:

Artist Estelle Chaigne curated a program of WFG Catalogue works which screened at L'Œil d'Oodaaq in Rennes, France, in December 2022. The films selected were *My Winnipeg* by Guy Maddin (2007), *We're Talking Vulva* by Tracy Treager and Shawna Dempsey (1990), *Black Forest* by Diana Thorneycroft (2020), and *Tudor Village: a one take deal* by Rhayne Vermette (2012).

The Cinematheque in Vancouver screened a Guy Maddin Retrospective in January 2023. The series featured a selection of shorts including *The Dead Father* (1985) and *Sissy Boy Slap Party* (2004) as well as features such as *Careful* (1992), *Cowards Bend the Knee* (2003), and *The Saddest Music in the World* (2003). The Retrospective also featured a screening of *Archangel* (1990) in 35mm.

From January to June 2023, *Footsteps* by Jeremy Benning (2020) was broadcast on Air Canada's In-Flight Films.

In February 2023, Caribou in the Archive by Jennifer Dysart (2019) screened at the Florida State University Museum of Fine Arts.

From February through August 2023, *Brown Town Muddy Water* by Jesse Green (2015) streamed on Hot Docs at Home presented by Hot Docs International Documentary Film Festival.

The Reimagining Queer Liberation Series, presented by Pleasure Dome TO in April 2023, featured *Grand Mother Tongue* by Chanelle Lajoie (2021).

For National Canadian Film Day in April 2023, Le Circuit Beaumont in Quebec City screened *Crime Wave* by John Paizs (1985).

yaya/ayat by Hagere Selam (shimby) Zegeye-Gebrehiwot screened at the inaugural edition of IN RELATION: BLACK EXPERIMENTAL FILM FESTIVAL in May 2023.

During Indigenous History Month, the Remai Modern in Saskatoon screened *Spirit Bear and Children Maker History* by Amanda Strong and Spotted Fawn Productions (2020).

WFG Catalogue screenings at festivals outside of Canada include Birrarangga Festival in Naarm, Australia, Kaboom Animation Festival in Amsterdam, Monstra Animated Film Festival in Lisbon, Margaret Mead Film Festival in New York City, Indigen – Das Nordamerika Filmfestival in Stuttgart, Ravenheart International Film Festival in Oslo, Moviate Underground Film Festival in Harrisburg, the Indigenous Peoples Festival in Seattle, and the Kabayitos Microcinema Experimental Short Film Program in NYC.











There were also screenings at well-loved Canadian festivals such as the 8fest, Halifax Independent Filmmakers Festival, Festival REGARD, Skoden Indigenous Film Festival, FIN Atlantic International Film Festival, Breakthroughs Film Festival, Toronto Jewish Film Festival, the Future of Film Showcase, Reel Pride, DOXA Documentary Film Festival, Dreamspeakers Festival Society, Images Festival, Vox Popular Media Arts Festival, International Festival of Films on Art (le FIFA), Kingston Canadian Film Festival, Toronto Queer Film Festival, Asinabka Film & Media Arts Festival, and Gimli International Film Festival.

WFG Catalogue works purchased for educational use were acquired and screened by organizations such as the Telus Spark Science Centre in Calgary, Out On Screen's Out In Schools program, Dryden Public Library, the Manitoba College of Social Workers, and the LGBTQA+ Centre at the Wright State University as well as institutions such as the University of Toronto, Northern Michigan University, the University of Regina, Athabasca University, Toronto Metropolitan University, the Pembina Trails School Division, Champlain College, the School District of Mystery Lake, St. James-Assiniboia School Division, and the Toronto District School Board.

Archive/Counter-Archive WFG Case Study:

Found Footage: Re-Examining the History of the Winnipeg Film Group



Since 2019, the WFG Distribution Department has been one of eight Case Studies participating in a \$2.5 million SSHRC-funded project led by York University. Archive/Counter-Archive: Activating Canada's Moving Image Heritage (ACA) is a seven-year research-creation partnership that seeks to redress the crisis facing Canadian audiovisual heritage through a systematic, multi-institutional plan for facilitating public access and policy. ACA pairs partners from across the country including galleries, festivals, media arts distributors, universities and archives.

Found Footage: Re-Examining the History of the Winnipeg Film Group, the WFG Case Study, asks what archives can reveal about a city shaped by immigration, but built on Indigenous land, and how to re-centre the work of women filmmakers in our narratives.

The Distribution staff work closely on the Case Study with Andrew Burke, Associate Professor in the Department of English at the University of Winnipeg.

Highlights from the ACA Case Study from July 2022 to June 2023 include:

In April 2023, the department announced that sahgothé (redsun) was selected as the ACA Artist in Residence. sahgothé (redsun) is a two-spirit Dënësųłinë and Nehithaw land and water protector, & multi-media artist. The beauty of the land, people, and spirits inspires the creation of their art which surrounds a non-linear form of being and creating. Their livelihood & practice as a two-spirit person is deeply ingrained in the land, ceremony, and ancestral connection.

In May 2023, the department hired Skye Callow as Archival Media Project Manager. Supported by Young Canada Works at Building Careers in Heritage, Skye assisted the department with researching, digitizing, and cataloging archival materials in the WFG's collection. Skye (re)connected with filmmakers whose works are in the WFG's historical collection and collaborated with the department to ensure that all data collection and digitization went smoothly.

In June 2023, the department welcomed Diana Hotka, Masters Graduate student in Film Preservation and Collections Management at Toronto Metropolitan University, who completed her school work placement at the WFG. Diana shared her immense knowledge involving film handling, film preservation, and data collection with the department in a series of workshops. She also developed a Better Practices manual and advanced the methods of categorization and preservation used in the WFG vault.





VUCAVU

The WFG is happy to continue their partnership with VUCAVU, the pan-Canadian VOD platform, to support the digital distribution of Canadian independent film, video, and media art.

The Distribution Department maintains the goal to have all of their catalogue searchable, if not able to view digitally, on the platform in the coming years. In the winter of 2022, the WFG Online Catalogue was made public on the VUCAVU platform.

In June 2022, the Distribution Department was fortunate to be present at the Canadian Independent Media in Education Symposium, hosted by VUCAVU in both Toronto and Montreal.

The symposium discussed the challenges of distributing and programming in educational settings, as the distribution of Canadian Independent film, video and media arts is increasingly challenged by large corporate video distribution platforms. This reality leaves many stories, histories and cultures of people from across Canada out of the classrooms.

The symposium brought together representatives from the academic and the media arts communities to find solutions, create connections, and discuss mutual concerns and goals for educational access. The information gained and relationships cultivated continue to assist the WFG with how best to bring their catalogue into educational settings.

Outreach

The Distribution Department was thrilled to be able to share information on distribution through a variety of platforms.

In the winter of 2022, NIMAC (National Indigenous Media Arts Coalition) invited the WFG to share a video discussing the department and the services they provide. The video was shared through NIMAC's newsletter and social media channels.

The department was also fortunate to visit classrooms at Canadian Mennonite University and Red River Collegiate to discuss the in's and out's of distribution and answer questions for film students.

MFM Marketing Fund:

Funded by Manitoba Film and Music (MFM), the Marketing Fund helps filmmakers market and distribute media artworks by contributing to the cost of promotional materials and marketing expenses. Filmmakers can receive a maximum of \$750 per project through this fund.
